


## Looking for a good read? Our resident bibliophile recommends:

The Pulitizer prize winning author of Olive Kitteridge draws you into this quiet, lovely and heartbreaking novel that is restrained yet fully expressive.

Strout reminds us of the power of our stories and our ability to transcend a troubled past. This small gem of a novel will stay with you for a long time after you've read the final words.
